The Salford Safeguarding Children Partnership's 'Making a Difference' Project aims to hear what young people are saying, to learn from what they tell us and to make sure their views influence the way that all services work with children and their families.

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We Listened

Young People have shared their time, views and ideas generously in great work co-produced with different services in Salford e.g. Route 29, Ambitions for Health and Wellbeing.

Their views and voices are heard through conversations, consultations and working partnerships such as Salford Youth Council, Voice of the Child, Fight for Change Council, YouCan, Hear our Voice.

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What Matters?

Young People have told us what matters to them and what they want from the people they work with:

"Being heard – listened to" "Talk to us, take us seriously" "Listen & show you're listening"

"Care and show it – show it through your expressions, face, voice, body language"

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"You have to trust people and they have to trust you"

"It's good to be listened to and when they double check I know they have heard what I said"

"I feel like a newborn baby having to start again repeating myself... if your worker changes they should know basic information"
